### PURPOSE or ACTION REQUESTED:

Approval of recommended Watershed Heroes Awards recipients for 2017.

#### PROJECT/PROGRAM LOCATION:

The 2017 Watershed Heroes Awards will be presented at St. Mary's Greek Orthodox Church in Minneapolis on November 2, 2017.

#### PROJECT TIMELINE:

- On June 8, 2017, the MCWD Board of Managers approved restructuring the Watershed Heroes awards to reflect the five guiding principles of the organization. The new awards also retain the Young Naturalist category and the Lifetime Stewardship award, which has been renamed in honor of Cynthia Krieg.
- On June 21, 2017 staff distributed a news release announcing the new awards and soliciting nominations. By the July 21st deadline, a total of 16 nominations were received.
- On July 25, the nominations were discussed at a subcommittee meeting attended by several staff, Citizens Advisory Committee President Bill Bushnell, CAC member Steve Mohn and Board of Managers President Sherry White. The subcommittee agreed on a list of award recipients to be presented to the Planning and Policy Committee.
- On July 27, the Planning and Policy Committee recommended approval of the subcommittee's list.
- The MCWD Board of Managers will be asked for final approval of the award recipients at its meeting on August 10, 2017.
- In August, a press release will be issued announcing the award recipients and invitations will printed and mailed after Labor Day.

• The awards will be presented at the Sunset Celebration at St. Mary's Greek Orthodox Church in Minneapolis on November 2.

### **PAST BOARD ACTIONS:**

- On March 8, 2007, the MCWD Board of Managers appointed Managers Keeley and Smith to a 40<sup>th</sup>
  Anniversary subcommittee which will work with staff to plan the events series. In August 2007, the
  MCWD Board of Managers authorized the 2008 work plan for the Education and Communications
  program, which includes "Watershed Events, including Watershed Heroes Award Event."
- On February 14, 2008, the MCWD Board of Managers directed staff to plan an awards ceremony
  event of less magnitude than the "Blue Tie" gala of 2007. On February 21, 2008, the MCWD Board of
  Managers approved resolution 08-010, 2008 Events: Watershed Events: Watershed Awareness
  campaign.
- On June 26, 2008, the MCWD Board of Managers approved the 2009 Education Work Plan, which
  includes the Watershed Heroes event. On January 15, 2009, the MCWD Board of Managers assigned
  Managers Keeley, Blixt and Klingelhutz to the Awards Committee.
- On July 16, 2009, the MCWD Board of Managers approved the 2010 Education Work Plan, which
  includes the Watershed Heroes Event.
- On October 7, 2010, the MCWD Board of Managers approved the 2011 Education and Communications Work Plan, which includes the Watershed Heroes event and Manager Bill Olson filled the vacancy on the Awards Committee left by Manager Klingelhutz's resignation.
- On July 7, 2011, the MCWD Board of Managers approved the 2012 Education Work Plan, which
  includes the Watershed Heroes event. On April 5, 2012, Manager Davis White filled the vacancy on the
  Awards Committee left by Manager Keeley's departure from the Board of Managers.
- On July 26, 2012, the MCWD Board of Managers approved the 2013 Communications Work Plan, which includes the Watershed Heroes event.
- On June 13, 2013, the MCWD Board of Managers approved the 2014 Communications Work Plan, which includes the Watershed Heroes event.
- In September 2014, the MCWD Board of Managers approved the 2015 District budget, which included the 2015 Communications Work Plan and budget for the Watershed Heroes event.
- In September 2015, the MCWD Board of Managers approved the 2016 District budget, which did not include the Watershed Heroes event pending the outcome of a strategic review of the District's programs and development of the District's commemoration of its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary in 2017.
- In September 2016, the MCWD Board of Managers approved the 2017 District budget, which included funding for a Watershed Heroes event as part of the District's 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary celebration.
- On December 8, 2016, the MCWD Board of Managers approved the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary events series, which includes the Sunset Celebration on November 2<sup>nd</sup> where the Watershed Heroes awards will be presented.
- On June 8, 2017, the MCWD Board of Managers approved a restructured Watershed Heroes awards
  program which includes new awards named after the District's guiding principles, a Young Naturalist
  award and the Cynthia Krieg Lifetime Stewardship award. The board also approved holding formal
  ceremonies once every five years and, in the intervening years, presenting awards in the community or
  at MCWD Board of Managers meetings.

### **SUMMARY:**

The intent of the Watershed Heroes awards is to recognize individuals and organizations who performed outstanding public service related to water resources in the Minnehaha Creek Watershed District.

The MCWD Board of Managers has identified seven categories of Watershed Heroes Awards with the following criteria:

- Partnership Given to an organization or individual that has effectively leveraged their assets in partnership with the Minnehaha Creek Watershed District to achieve exceptional results in natural resource management, integrate their work with the District's and add broader value to the community.
- **Innovation** Given to an organization or individual that has implemented innovative policies, programs, or projects to protect and improve quality of water, quality of life in the Minnehaha Creek Watershed.
- **Excellence** Given to an organization or individual that achieves outstanding natural resource benefits in the Minnehaha Creek Watershed District.
- **Sound Science** Given to an organization or individual that makes a meaningful contribution to the scientific body of knowledge related to natural resource protection.
- **Service** Given to an organization or individual that has demonstrated a commitment to the environment or whose actions have resulted in the protection or improvement of natural resources in the Minnehaha Creek Watershed.
- Young Naturalist Given to an organization or individual that has demonstrated a commitment to the
  environment or whose actions have resulted in the protection or improvement of natural resources in
  the Minnehaha Creek Watershed.
- Cynthia Krieg Lifetime Stewardship Award Given to an individual who has, during his or her lifetime, played a significant and lasting role in watershed management and demonstrated leadership in natural resources stewardship.

The following nominations are proposed for 2017 Watershed Heroes awards:

# Partnership Award – Japs-Olson Company

For its commitment to partnership in achieving an environmentally friendly expansion of its business that was the culmination of several years of work with the District. Japs-Olson Company worked in partnership with the District to treat stormwater from the expansion and the surrounding area, and donated nearly four acres of land for restoration and improved public access to the Minnehaha Creek Preserve and the Minnehaha Creek Greenway. The project involved a complex series of agreements with the Cities of Hopkins and St. Louis Park and resulted in a project that improves water quality, ecological integrity and community connectivity, and is projected to create 150 jobs.

### Innovation Award – Lennar Corporation

For its hard work and creative spirit in its pursuit of a 99-unit residential development in Victoria. By working in coordination with the City of Victoria and the District, the project will restore 12 acres and permanently protect 23.5 acres of public water wetland, which is beyond Lennar's regulatory obligation. Its willingness to invest in

natural resources locally enabled the restoration of a priority wetland that's in the Six Mile Subwatershed, which is a priority area for improvement projects.

## Excellence Award - Park Nicollet

For its leadership and vision in improving Minnehaha Creek, which sparked the creation of the Minnehaha Creek Greenway – a series of improvements that restores the natural curves to the creek, improves wildlife habitat, creates new access to green space and connects communities. Park Nicollet's commitment to balancing excellent service to the community and supporting ecological integrity in the landscape continued with the construction of a flood wall in 2017 that resulted in a six-acre wetland restoration.

# Sound Science Award - Dr. Peter Sorensen

For his commitment to researching common carp's impact on our water resources and developing an integrated protocol to sustainably control common carp in a system. Dr. Sorensen's ground-breaking research has improved the understanding of the role carp has played in damaging ecosystems and has provided a path forward to effective management strategies.

#### Service Award – Minneapolis Area Synod of the ELCA

For their collective achievement in engaging a broad network of congregations in the watershed to increase awareness of water quality issues and spark stewardship of the natural resources in their communities. Over the past two years, congregations have hosted stewardship events, adopted sustainable property maintenance practices, educated their congregants about clean water and pursued sustainable measures to mitigate polluted stormwater runoff.

# Young Naturalist Award - The Blake School Fourth Grade Class

For their creativity and enthusiasm in learning about the importance of our water resources and how to protect them from stormwater runoff. Through a combination of classroom and field learning experiences, the students demonstrated their new-found knowledge through the creation of 3-D models of the Minnehaha Creek Greenway to visualize and demonstrate runoff, cleanups along the creek and nearby storm drains, and tours of the watershed. Their efforts serve as a role model for experiential learning that connects people to our water resources.

# <u>Cynthia Krieg Lifetime Stewardship Award</u> – Peggy Knapp

For her dedication to protecting water resources, which has had a lasting impact on lakes, rivers, streams and wetlands across the region and the state. Hired as the Freshwater Society's Director of Programs 2010, Knapp has designed and implemented a multitude of civic engagement programs including the Master Water Stewards Program which was founded in the MCWD in 2013 and is being expanded statewide.

Known for her dynamic communications style and work on multiple platforms including television, Knapp has inspired and educated countless citizens to protect Minnesota's water resources. She is a natural leader and collaborator who knows how to bring people together to solve problems and get things done.

Knapp retired from the Freshwater Society in June 2017.
