84	President White opened the public hearing.
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86	Ms. Kailey Cermak appeared before the Board of Managers to provide background
87	information on the proposed County Road 6 Pond Retrofit Project. She reviewed the
88	history and background for the project, noting that this pond handles 70% of the Long
89	Lake drainage area and is underperforming, as phosphorus is still leaving the pond in

significant amounts. She reviewed the feasibility study and alternative concepts for improving the pond's performance and noted that the gravity sand filter bench with an expanded earthen berm between the pond cells was recommended as the best option and could remove between 52 -73 pounds of phosphorus per year. Ms. Cermak noted that the City of Orono adopted a resolution of support for the project on March 11.

Ms. Cermak noted that a few comments had been received from the public, in the form of questions from neighboring property owners about the process for the project and expressing an interest in attending a meeting about the project design in the future. Also, the property owner of the project site, Mr. John Newell, has expressed concern about whether the configuration of the filter bench will limit access to the weir, which will be addressed in project design. In response to a question from Manager Miller, Ms. Cermak reviewed the filter bench location and the flow of water through the pond.

President White invited comments from the public. No one appeared to offer comments. President White closed the public hearing. The managers thanked Ms. Cermak for her presentation.

ACTION ITEMS

Resolution 24-018: Ordering the County Road 6 Retrofit Project and Authorizing Request for Proposals for Design and Engineering Services

Ms. Cermak reviewed the scope of the request for proposals, the budget, and project timetable.

It was moved by Manager Olson, seconded by Manager Miller to adopt Resolution 24-018: Ordering the County Road 6 Retrofit Project and Authorizing Request for Proposals for Design and Engineering Services as follows:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that pursuant to Minnesota Statutes §103B.251 and the WMP, the Minnehaha Creek Watershed District Board of Managers orders the County Road 6 Pond Retrofit Project;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the MCWD Board of Managers authorizes the District Administrator, on advice of counsel, to release a request for proposals for engineering design services.

In response to a question from Manager Miller, Ms. Cermak reviewed the general plans for the Holbrook Pond project and other improvements in the Long Lake to Tanager Bay management unit area. Mr. Wisker noted further that these projects are included in the Long Lake Roadmap as potential projects with estimated costs. Manager Maxwell inquired about the process for raking the filter sand and Ms. Cermak noted that the

- precise method will be determined through design. In response to a question from Manager Olson, Mr. Chris Meehan compared a notched weir to a V weir and the
- purposes of these designs in relation to management responses to various storm events.
- Manager Olson asked about maintenance and how the filter media may be changed to
- address dissolved phosphorus, and Ms. Cermak noted that the filter media will be
- changed in ten-year cycles, and that berm will help to filter more sediment in the first cell
- of the pond. In response to a question from Manager Hejmadi, Mr. Michael Hayman
- appeared before the Board of Managers to review plans for disposal of the filter sand,
- noting that it would likely not be contaminated and useful for building projects. Manager
- Maxwell asked about keeping the city and residents informed about the progress of the
- project, and Ms. Cermak noted plans to do so, including a meeting to review project
- design. In response to a question from Manager Hejmadi, Ms. Cermak affirmed plans to
- monitor the effectiveness of the project once constructed.

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There being no further discussion, upon vote, the motion carried 6-0.
