#### PURPOSE or ACTION REQUESTED:

- 1) Authorize funding in the amount of \$98,200 for 15 grant proposals to the Cynthia Krieg Watershed Stewardship Fund during the 2017 cycle. These projects are designed to forward the mission of the watershed district through innovative educational activities that leverage existing or promote new collaborative community partnerships.
- 2) Authorize the District Administrator to execute and sign grant agreements with each of the recipients.

#### **PAST BOARD ACTIONS:**

#### **SUMMARY:**

The Cynthia Krieg Watershed Stewardship Fund was established by the MCWD in 2000 in memory of Cynthia Krieg, whose life exemplified dedication to community service and natural resource protection. This fund supports projects that encourage community service initiatives that protect water quality and promote public awareness of nonpoint source pollution and clean water practices. Applications are accepted on an annual basis for projects to be completed during the following calendar year.

In 2017, the Cynthia Krieg Watershed Stewardship Fund has approximately \$100,000 available for distribution. The MCWD received 16 applications requesting \$194,035. Applications were reviewed by Education staff, followed by a subcommittee of approximately 15 staff on October 28, 2016. All applications were reviewed by the Cynthia Krieg CAC subcommittee on November 2, 2016 and the full CAC on November 9, 2016.

#### STAFF RECOMMENDATION:

Based on staff and committee reviews, it is recommended that 15 applications be awarded grant funds for a total distribution of \$98,200, and the District Administrator has authorization to execute and sign grant agreements with each recipient. ## **Project Summaries:**

I. Alliance for Sustainability – Linking Master Water Stewards with Neighborhoods for Water Quality

Alliance for Sustainability will strengthen engagement of Master Water Stewards in Edina, St. Louis Park, Minneapolis, Hopkins, and Minnetonka through raingarden maintenance days and by supporting targeted education and behavior change campaigns. The ultimate goal is to empower more residents & businesses to take action in achieving outcomes of their City's surface water management plans.

Funding request: \$12,000 / Funding recommendation: \$1,250

II. The Blake School – Using Plants to Fight Runoff Pollution – 4<sup>th</sup> Graders at The Blake School

The Blake School 4<sup>th</sup> graders will learn about the water cycle and impact of runoff pollution on water (especially Minnehaha Creek). Students will travel the length of the creek, learning how the creek has changed, and how human choices impact the creek. Students will participate in a public service project by planting native plants on campus to improve creek health through erosion prevention. Students and teachers will partner to create signage at school talking about runoff and how people can protect the creek.

Funding request: \$1,650 / Funding recommendation: \$1,450

III. Clear Springs Elementary School – Clear Springs Elementary Inquiry-Based Community Watershed Project

Clear Springs Elementary School 5<sup>th</sup> graders will partner with a Master Water Steward working to install a cistern and raingardens at a St. Louis Park townhome. Students will learn about raingardens, stormdrains, and the environmental impacts of runoff. Students will then assist with raingarden installation, assist in interpretive signage development, and host a "Watershed Outreach Day" where they describe their project and what they learned to community members, city council members, etc.

Funding request: \$3,365 / Funding recommendation: \$3,000

IV. Freshwater Society - Community Resilience Workshops - Building Resilience to Our Changing Climate

Freshwater Society will utilize a public planning process that educates and engages communities on the importance of climate change, current and anticipated impacts, and the need to build community resilience through planning. Freshwater will facilitate a series of interactive workshops designed to identify local impacts, increase understanding of risk and vulnerability and identify strategies to increase resilience. The outcome will be local and specific climate change action plans for participating communities that can be incorporated into municipal comprehensive plans.

Funding request: \$15,000 / Funding recommendation: \$5,000

V. Freshwater Society - Helping Cities Work with Master Water Stewards to Achieve MS4 Goals

Freshwater Society will host an interactive event that will showcase examples of city efforts that have successfully engaged Master Water Stewards – presented by the city staff who led those efforts – and develop a framework other cities can use to effectively leverage the expertise and role of MWS. This will allow cities to better leverage the value Stewards can bring when trying to meet their MS4 permit goals.

Funding request: \$15,000 / Funding recommendation: \$7,500

VI. Friends of the Mississippi River – Minnehaha Creek Watershed Stewardship Initiative

Friends of the Mississippi River will host three community workshops to train and inspire local residents to take action in their homes and yards to protect local water resources. FMR will provide expanded opportunities for engagement and education, and will provide information on new, emerging pollution issues such as chloride impairments and micro-plastic fibers. Post-event follow up outreach and evaluation will provide valuable information about the impact of the workshops and push participants towards behavior changes and in-the-ground projects at home.

Funding request: \$9,720 / Funding recommendation: \$7,500

### VII. Great River Greening – Field Learning for Teens

Great River Greening will pilot the Field Learning for Teens program in the Minnehaha Creek Greenway. GRG will work with science teachers and youth leaders to use restoration sites as vehicles to reinforce water quality concepts and inspire a passion for lifelong stewardship.

Funding request: \$10,000 / Funding recommendation: \$10,000

# VIII. Hamline University CGEE - Lake Hiawatha Adopt-A-Drain

Hamline University will expand the Adopt-a-Drain outreach program in the Lake Hiawatha watershed by building on the current initiative and expanding into areas of the watershed not in direct proximity to the lake. Hamline will evaluate the similarities and differences in the two geographic areas to help determine how outreach methods and proximity to a water body affects adoption.

Funding request: \$15,000 / Funding recommendation: \$6,000

### IX. Lowry Hill East Neighborhood Association – Low Salt Diet for Minneapolis Businesses

The Environmental Committee of the Lowry Hill East Neighborhood Association will conduct a survey in a pilot area of southwest Minneapolis to determine current practices for snow removal and deicing of sidewalks. The survey will determine the preferred educational tools to develop an educational outreach campaign designed specifically for Minneapolis business nodes. The goal of the campaign is to reduce the amount of salt being used on Minneapolis sidewalks and parking lots.

Funding request: \$12,300 / Funding recommendation: \$10,000

# X. Metro Blooms – Maintenance Training & Certification for Non-Stormwater Professionals

Metro Blooms will expand the availability of qualified and affordable maintenance services provided by volunteers and for hire by developing and offering a field training program for the non-stormwater professional. Primary audiences include youth participating in outdoor job programs and adults in natural resource volunteer programs including Master Water Stewards, Master Gardeners, and Master Naturalists. Following training, Metro Blooms will connect certified graduates with property owners in need of maintenance services.

Funding request: \$15,000 / Funding recommendation: \$10,000

#### XI. Nawayee Center School – Mde Maka Ska Canoe Nations Gathering

The Mde Maka Ska Canoe Nations Gathering event is an opportunity for Native American youth, parents, and community to re-engage the sacredness of water (mni wakan) by reintegrating this important piece of history surrounding the local water systems into local school curriculum. This day long educational event at Mde Maka Ska (Lake Calhoun) is part of a series of educational programs that help bring the Native American community together to learn about sacred waters.

Funding request: \$15,000 / Funding recommendation: \$1,000

# XII. Northern Lights.mn – Water Quality Chorus

Northern Lights will collaborate with artist collective Plotform to work with volunteer citizen scientists, leaders from the local singing community, and other clean water partners to translate water quality data into stories and songs shared and two participatory science+art events in the Minnehaha Creek watershed. The project seeks to build awareness about, empathy for, and increased caretaking of the watershed's waterways through the collective embodied experience of song.

Funding request: \$15,000 / Funding recommendation: \$0

## XIII. Southwest High School PTSA Wellness Committee – Water, Wellness, & Worldview

The Wellness Committee of Southwest High School's PTSA will conduct a year-long study of how water, wellness, and worldview (WWW) are intricately connected – culminating in an all-school event tied to Wellness Day. The project stems from the mission of SWHS "to develop the whole person", and the momentum after 2015's first ever Wellness Day, to weave a culture of wellness into the fabric of SWHS while helping other schools do the same. WWW would help build healthy individuals who understand that their world and their water are intricately tied to their wellbeing.

Funding request: \$15,000 / Funding recommendation: \$5,000

### XIV. Tree Trust - Be a Steward, Plant a Tree, Clean the Water

Tree Trust will partner in fall 2017 with communities in the Minnehaha Creek Watershed District to offer a tree distribution and education program to residents. The program will educate homeowners on the benefits of trees in protecting and improving water quality, and would aid homeowners in planting trees to mitigate stormwater runoff. Tree Trust will target the upper watershed to distribute up to 200 trees and educate hundreds of residents.

Funding request: \$10,000 / Funding recommendation: \$8,000

XV. University of Minnesota – Connecting Stormwater Management to Bees, Pollinators, Other Beneficial Insects & Healthy Ecosystems

The University of Minnesota Bee Squad will build on lessons and successes of their 2016 grant by modifying and expanding the exploration of connecting stormwater management to beneficial insects, including bees and other pollinators, and healthy ecosystems to reduce pesticide use and increase water quality. The Bee Squad will offer 4 interactive events within the watershed, expand data collection via a photo survey, and hold an end of season event highlighting the collected data.

Funding request: \$15,000 / Funding recommendation: \$7,500

**XVI. Wilderness Inquiry** – "Own Your Shed": Increasing Access, Connections, and Ownership through Place-Based Watershed Education

Wilderness inquiry will connect over 2,000 youth and their families to hands-on watershed education. Youth develop environmental stewardship through a three-step approach: *access* to their watershed through experiences such as canoeing and water quality testing, *connection* to their watershed by engaging in a service learning project, and *ownership* of their watershed by learning how changing behaviors positively impacts and protects the watershed. The project will engage youth and communities in MCWD through both small and large-scale events.

Funding request: \$15,000 / Funding recommendation: \$15,000

Applications are accepted on an annual basis for projects to be completed during the following calendar year.

In 2017, the Cynthia Krieg Watershed Stewardship Fund has approximately \$100,000 available for distribution. The MCWD received 16 applications requesting \$194,035. Applications were reviewed by Education staff, followed by a subcommittee of approximately 15 staff on October 28, 2016. All applications were reviewed by the Cynthia Krieg CAC subcommittee on November 2, 2016 and the full CAC on November 9, 2016.

#### **Staff Recommendation**

Based on staff and committee reviews, it is recommended that 15 applications be awarded grant funds for a total distribution of \$98,200. Below is a summary of each project, the recommended funding level, and an explanation of why that level is being recommended by the review committees.

Alliance for Sustainability will strengthen engagement of Master Water Stewards in Edina, St. Louis Park, Minneapolis, Hopkins, and Minnetonka through raingarden maintenance days and by supporting targeted education and behavior change campaigns. The ultimate goal is to empower more residents & businesses to take action in achieving outcomes of their City's surface water management plans.

The Alliance for Sustainability application has three distinct goals as part of the project. The review committees felt Goal 1 was a duplication of efforts by the Metro Blooms application. Staff review also flagged Goal 3 as an activity that should be led by staff, rather than an outside organization or a Master Water Steward representing the District. In Goal 2, review committees felt Activity B was a duplication of efforts by the Hamline CGEE application. Therefore, the recommendation for \$1,250 was to fund specifically Goal 2, Activities A and C.

Hamline University will expand the Adopt-a-Drain outreach program in the Lake Hiawatha watershed by building on the current initiative and expanding into areas of the watershed not in direct proximity to the lake. Hamline will evaluate the similarities and differences in the two geographic areas to help determine how outreach methods and proximity to a water body affects adoption.

MCWD staff and review committees are very supportive of the "Adopt-a-Drain" program growing in the District, especially in the Lake Hiawatha watershed. On closer inspection of the budget, review committees are recommending utilizing Master Water Stewards and other volunteers in the outreach to significantly decrease the cost of direct outreach labor.

**Summary Explanation** 

The Environmental Committee of the Lowry Hill East Neighborhood Association will conduct a survey in a pilot area of southwest Minneapolis to determine current practices for snow removal and deicing of sidewalks. The survey will determine the preferred educational tools to develop an educational outreach campaign designed specifically for Minneapolis business nodes. The goal of the campaign is to reduce the amount of salt being used on Minneapolis sidewalks and parking lots.

Review committees felt this project was extremely innovative and addresses a definite need in the community to target businesses and contract snow-removal professionals. The project is led by a passionate Master Water Steward who has already dedicated significant time to the issue. The CAC review committee wanted to support all aspects of the project except the "review of existing education and outreach materials" (noted as part of Objective 2, Activity A). Review committees also wanted to ensure all aspects of the project take place in MCWD.

Summary Explanation

Metro Blooms will expand the availability of qualified and affordable maintenance services provided by volunteers and for hire by developing and offering a field training program for the non-stormwater professional. Primary audiences include youth participating in outdoor job programs and adults in natural resource volunteer programs including Master Water Stewards, Master Gardeners, and Master Naturalists. Following training, Metro Blooms will connect certified graduates with property owners in need of maintenance services.

The Metro Blooms proposal fills a need demonstrated in previous research to have *affordable* trained maintenance professionals available for hire. Review committees agree this need exists, but chose to not fund project fully as MCWD has been supporting Metro Blooms in a variety of capacities for many years. On inspection of the budget, review committees felt the award of \$10,000 was sufficient to support the viability of the project.

The Mde Maka Ska Canoe Nations Gathering event is an opportunity for Native American youth, parents, and community to re-engage the sacredness of water (mni wakan) by reintegrating this important piece of history surrounding the local water systems into local school curriculum. This day long educational event at Mde Maka Ska (Lake Calhoun) is part of a series of educational programs that help bring the Native American community together to learn about sacred waters.

Summary

Review committees felt the majority of the project was to support a one-time event that already exists and would ensure the event is sustainable in the future. Currently, MCWD already supports this event in other capacities. The CAC review committee recommended \$1,000 be awarded for the purpose of creating a video about how the school and the event supports water quality protection and stewardship in the Native American communities. The video proposal was discussed with Nawayee Center School and they were very supportive of the idea, pending funding.

Tree Trust will partner in fall 2017 with communities in the Minnehaha Creek Watershed District to offer a tree distribution and education program to residents. The program will educate homeowners on the benefits of trees in protecting and improving water quality, and would aid homeowners in planting trees to mitigate stormwater runoff. Tree Trust will target the upper watershed to distribute up to 200 trees and educate hundreds of residents.

The review committees were supportive of this project that allows residents to make the direct connection between planting a tree and improving water quality. However, staff recommends the project targets communities with fewer trees (rather than Mound or Minnetrista as the proposal currently suggests).

Summary Explanation

The University of Minnesota Bee Squad will build on lessons and successes of their 2016 grant by modifying and expanding the exploration of connecting stormwater management to beneficial insects, including bees and other pollinators, and healthy ecosystems to reduce pesticide use and increase water quality. The Bee Squad will offer 4 interactive events within the watershed, expand data collection via a photo survey, and hold an end of season event highlighting the collected data.

While the CAC review committee was supportive of projects that encourage pollinators in conjunction with stormwater management, staff felt there might be better partnerships with the Bee Squad that are closer to the District mission. The CAC review committee recommended funding the project at 50% to continue to build on the lessons learned from their 2016 grant. Additionally, equipment expenses (such as the camera and lenses) will not be eligible for funding.

Summary Explanation

Wilderness inquiry will connect over 2,000 youth and their families to hands-on watershed education. Youth develop environmental stewardship through a threestep approach: *access* to their watershed through experiences such as canoeing and water quality testing, *connection* to their watershed by engaging in a service learning project, and *ownership* of their watershed by learning how changing behaviors positively impacts and protects the watershed. The project will engage youth and communities in MCWD through both small and large-scale events.

Both review committees are very supportive of this organization and the successful, high-quality programming they do in the watershed engaging underserved youth populations. This proposal builds on past grants through encouraging further stewardship efforts and getting youth and families to take ownership of their local waters and watershed. Wilderness Inquiry is a valued partner to MCWD, and one staff plans on continuing to support in the future outside of grants.
